Some good practical advice on Dogs and Children

Plunket issues guide to keep children safe from dog attacks 15 April 2003

Teaching children how to behave around dogs could save them from being attacked by the animals, Plunket says.

Proposed new laws announced yesterday will require all dogs to be microchipped so they can be identified. Local councils will be able to require any dog of "a temperament or type that could be dangerous" to be muzzled.

Recent media attention given to vicious attacks on children should be used to make people aware of ways to stop dog attacks rather than foster a sense of fear, Plunket national safety adviser Sue Campbell said today.

"It would be a shame if children were denied the benefits of pet ownership – the joy, the companionship, and a growing sense of responsibility – because of fear and lack of information," she said.

Some children who did not know how to behave with new dogs naturally squealed and rushed towards them, which could trigger the wrong instinct from the dog, animal management specialist Barry Gillingwater said.

"Fear, pain or confusion can all cause a dog to react to protect itself – some by barking or running, some by biting," Mr Gillingwater said.

Plunket issued a list of practices today it suggested could prevent dog attacks, if followed alongside responsible dog ownership and parental supervision of children:

- If approached by a dog, children should stand still and straight with arms close to their chests and fists under their chins.
- Children should not scream, stare a dog in the eyes or run. Dogs may see children running away as "prey to be chased" and could take staring as a challenge to fight.
- Children should turn slowly and keep the dog in view in front of them until it gets bored and leaves them. Most bites come from behind.
- They should not playfight with other children around a family dog. It may encourage a dog to protect its "family".
- Carers should supervise children when a dog is around.
- Children should never approach dogs that are tied up or in a vehicle. If it cannot escape, a dog may react from fear.
- Children should not pat dogs near the face, neck or top of the head.

Mr Gillingwater said most dog attacks happened in homes and familiar places, so pet dogs should be chosen with care.

Parents should choose breeds known to have good temperaments and avoid adult dogs with anti-social traits.
