## Tricks

I've had a request for some ideas on tricks we can teach our dogs. Unfortunately I haven't had a lot of time to get a whole lot together but l've put in some simple tricks and also a couple of books that I found on the internet that you might like to have a look at for ideas. Tricks are fun and are really good to teach your dog. Please remember to think about what you teach your dog. For example if you also show roses teaching your dog to pick flowers is probably not the best option. If you have problems with stays teaching your dog to crawl, roll over or bow are probably not the best either. Anyway here are some ideas:

Shake Hands - Put a piece of food in your hand and close your fist so the dog can only smell the food but not get it. You then tease the dog a little and keep asking it to get the food. Most dogs after a while will use their paws to try to get the food, as soon as they do release the food and praise. Do this until the dog knows it is the foot that releases the food, then put a command on it.

Twist - With food in your hand put it in front of the dog's nose and turn the dog by making it follow the food 360 o then praise and release the food saying 'twist' or whatever the command the handler wishes to use.

Bow - Place a piece of food between the dogs front legs in your hand, again so the dog can not get it and wait for the moment that the dog bends its front and not its back end. Praise and release the food.

And some other ideas:
Aah-Choo! (Bring the Kleenex); Answer The Telephone; Balance \& Catch The Biscuit; Bring The Dirty Clothes; Carry A Basket; Crawl; Dance; Find The Keys; Get The Remote Control; Give Me High Five; Hold A Flag; Hold A Sign; Jump Through A Hoop; Jump Through (Or Into) Your Arms; Jump Over Another Dog; Look Away; Open The Door; Open The Drawer; Open The Refrigerator \& Get A Soda; Paw/Shake/Slap Me Five; Paw Over Eye; Pick The Flower; Pose For The Camera; Push A Stroller Or Cart; Putting Away The Toys; Roll Over; Shake Off The Water; Sit Up Pretty; Sneeze; Stand Up Against The Wall; Take A Bow; The Shell Game; Touch Any Object With Dog's Nose ("targeting"); Turn On/Off The Light

## Boarding Kennels

Which ones best for us and our canine friends.

Last newsletter I did an article on my experience with a Boarding Kennel. I promised to do more investigating and report back my findings in the next newsletter. Unfortunately I have had rather a busy couple of months and haven't got around to getting all the information.

In general there were a lot of negative comments about (nearly all) the boarding kennels available in our area and a lot of it does come down to personal preference. In short the following comments were made from other people's experiences with boarding kennels:

Vilagresh - Welcome to inspect the kennels. Dogs are on concrete. All dogs together playing. They do not take dogs with known aggression problems but you never know. Seem to be clean kennels. One person's dog did develop a skin problem after being there.

Sanson Kennels - A long way to travel but these kennels seemed to be cheap and nice. A little worried about the security of the dogs. Person happy to take their dog back.

Glenside - owners making an effort although may not be very experienced. Seems lately they have employed knowledgeable people to work in the kennels. Apparently this is where the MAF Beagles are now staying. Nice clean kennels. Inspection welcome.

Judgeford Kennels - Not very good comments came out about this kennel. Dogs unclean and smelling very bad. Skin conditions after staying. Unable to inspect the kennels. Although it was commented that dogs seemed very happy in themselves when picked up. I can't help but think "while the cats away the mice will play" scenario here.

Levin Kennels - Rose and Sid. 5 stars here! Only kennel not to get any negative comments. Experienced owners. Clean kennels. Dogs NOT exercised together. A long way to drive if you're not going that way.

Editors pick - Levin Kennels if I'm going that way otherwise I'm going to give the new Glenside Kennels in Tawa a go.
